Extent of caring

- 32% provide care 1 or 2 days per week ...
- But 52% do this 5 or more days per week

- 59% spend less than 10 hours per week ...
- But 10% spend at least 30 hours per week

- 11% provided care for less than 6 months ...
- But 21% have done this for at least 5 years



- Snapshot of lives of young carers
- As with adults, young carers provide care that would otherwise be provided by other agencies, and/or paid by tax revenue
