## **Life and Times surveys**

#### ARK

 joint initiative across Queen's University Belfast and Ulster University, established in 2000

#### **Life and Times Surveys**

- NI Life & Times (NILT): 18+ (1998)
- Young Life & Times: 16 year olds (2003)
- Kids' Life & Times (KLT): 10/11 year old (2008)







#### **NI Life & Times**

- Annual survey, began in 1998
- Monitor the attitudes and behaviour of people in Northern Ireland
- Key social policy issues affecting our lives
- Time-series and public record of attitudes and behaviour







### **NI Life & Times**

#### 1998-2019:

- Face-to-face interview, plus self-completion
- Similar to NI Social Attitudes survey 1989-96

#### 2020-2022:

- Online questionnaire
- Phone interview

#### 2022

- 5 September to 20 November 2022
- Fieldwork undertaken by Ipsos







#### **NILT 2022**

Attitudes of a random sample of 1,405 adults aged 18 or over

- Good Relations, parades, reconciliation
- Minority ethnic groups
- Respect
- Politics
- Community safety, perception of paramilitary influence, political violence
- Criminal justice system
- Palliative care
- Gender-based violence
- Income and poverty
