

#### **Attitudes to climate change in Northern Ireland:**

- **Complacency vs. Urgency**: Despite widespread acknowledgment of the problem, Northern Ireland shows lower levels of worry and responsibility compared to other UK regions.
- Political Will: Public desire for action from elected officials remains strong.
- Call to Action: To overcome climate scepticism, increase trust in scientific institutions.



### Objectives

- 1. Assess barriers to awareness and engagement with adaptation by diverse publics
- 2. Increase understanding of system complexity
- 3. Identify and address aspects of **policy**, **legislation and regulation** that hold back the adaptation vision
- 4. Enhance the accessibility and understanding of climate model results for decision-makers










# TalX2 Next Steps



Fully establish the living labs and host workshops with the relevant communities & other stakeholders



Identify cross-border areas where transboundary dialogue facilitation would enhance partnership working and provide a programme of activities to help to exploit potential opportunities.



Evaluate and reflect on how the living labs and the cross-border programme of activities have developed over the course of the project and the wider benefits of participatory practices.



Promote the initial learnings from the project through widespread communication and dissemination.
